



A Day Out at The Parkridge Centre!

Preparing for your school visit



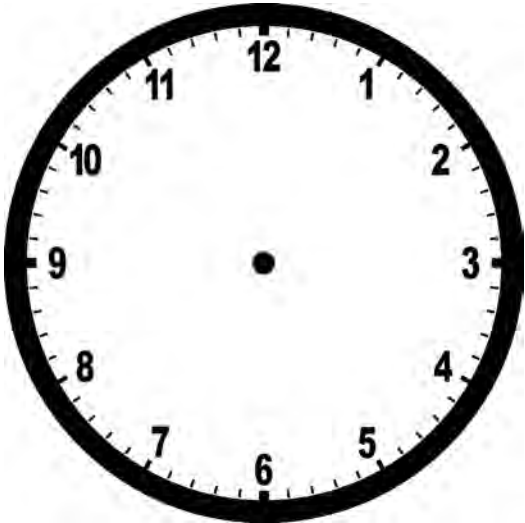
My name is...

I will be visiting the Parkridge Centre on...

The Parkridge Centre is at a Nature Reserve where you can learn about nature and the plants and creatures that live here. No animals are kept in cages - they are completely wild and so they are free to go wherever they like. You might see birds, rabbits, insects and ducks!

When you arrive at The Parkridge Centre this is where you will be dropped off at the start of the day and picked up to go back to school at the end of the day.

This is a busy car park and so your teacher will tell you where to stand and when to go. The Parkridge Centre is then a short walk through the park.



As you go through the park you will walk along the main path. Where it splits in two you will follow the right hand path.

There might be dogs running around the park: please do not touch them and if you don't like them, stay calm and let them walk past.





You will then walk towards The Parkridge Centre and in through the door.



Inside you will walk through the shop and cafe. There might be other members of the public here and it could also be quite busy and noisy but we will walk straight through towards the classroom.

After you have walked through the cafe you will walk past the toilets. If at any point you need the toilet there are boys, girls and disabled toilets. Make sure you ask an adult to take you.

In the classroom you will put your bags on a trolley or on a hook where they will be safe. You will then sit on the floor and listen to the leaders in red.



Your leaders in red will tell you that we will do two activities in the morning, then come back for lunch. We will do another two activities in the afternoon.

The leaders will also tell you what to do if the fire alarm goes off. They will say you don't need to worry, to stay with your group and follow your leader in red through a gate into the park and back towards the tearoom, where we will line up on the grass outside until it is safe to carry on.



At lunch time you will eat lunch in the classroom or maybe outside in the courtyard if the weather is good.



For most activities we will start off by walking as a group past a pond and then along this path.



If you are doing pond dipping this is where you will go to see what you can find in the pond, using our nets.



You might be going on a magical adventure or learning all about flowers and bees.

You will stop here and sit down using our log circle.



If you are going on a minibeast hunt you might come here to see what bugs you can find.





This is our arboretum.
Here we will stop
to do our activities.
This could be den
building, learning
about the creatures
that live here or
exploring the trees.



When we get here
we will walk up
two steps and
through the trees
to find our log seats.
Here you will sit on
the logs and listen to
your leader in red.

You might get the chance to walk around the lake and look out for the creatures that like to live here. Along the way there is a part without any fence, where we must all stay together and listen to your leader and teachers.



If we are using our senses to explore the outdoors we will come here and sit on the log seats.



At the end of the day we will all go back to the classroom to collect our bags. Your leaders will then take you back through the visitor centre to return to school.
